Signs of Sincere Love Romans 12:9-13

Loving conduct towards other believers appears to be the theme of verses 9-13. Note a similarity here with I Cor. chapters 12 and 13.

Sincere love despises evil & clings to what is good. 9

- ♦ Love w/o hypocrisy (believers: I Pt. 1:22, I Thess. 4:9, Jn. 13:34,35)

 Note how the 2nd half of these verses each connect to the 1st half.
- ♦Love requires hating evil and clinging to what is good, Amos 5:15.

Sincere love treats believers as family & honors them. 10

- ♦Believers are truly our family, Gal. 6:10, II Pt. 1:7, I Tim. 5:1,2.
- ◆Brotherly love requires showing honor to other believers, Phi. 2:3.

Sincere love diligently serves the Lord with great zeal. 11

- ◆Don't let your spiritual zeal give way to laziness, Matt. 25:26.
- ♦ Avoiding laziness requires staying fervent in slave-service, 6:22.

Sincere love endures hardship through hope & prayer. 12

- ♦We are called to rejoice in hope, 5:1, I Pt. 1:3,6, I Thess. 5:16-18
- ◆Being able to rejoice in hardship requires perseverance and prayer, 5:2-5, 8:25, I Thess. 5:16-18, Js. 5:13.

Sincere love is generous to the needy & hospitable. 13

- ♦ Helping needy believers: Gal. 6:10, I Tim. 5:3, 6:18, I Jn. 3:16-18
- ♦ Hospitality is required, I Tim. 3:2, I Pt. 4:9, Heb. 13:2. Why so?

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Practice Hospitality

In the New Testament, love is more of a verb than a noun. It has more to do with acting than with feeling. The call to love is not so much a call to a certain state of feeling as it is to a quality of action.
