Abimelech: the anti-Judge Judges 8:33-9:57

Abimelech kills his brothers to become King. 8:33-9:6

• Killing family for the crown also occurs in II Chron. 20:11, 21:4. What obviously helped motivate Abimelech's animosity toward his brothers?

•Abimelech's speech was full of promises his people foolishly lap up. Ironically this area had a sacred past: Gen. 12:6,7, 35:4, Josh. 24:1ff.

Jotham confronts Abimelech to utter a curse. 9:7-21

This fable is offered with a tone of objectivity--if kingship was gained properly, then rejoice— but if in the wrong way, then a curse on you.
What are the possible implications here for us today?

God judges Shechem through Abimelech. 9:22-49

 God sends an evil spirit as in I Sam. 16:14, I Kgs. 22:22 in order to turn evil against itself for the purpose of judgment, cf. Rev. 17:16,17.
Gaal is an opportunist whose arrival further alienates Shechem's people from Abimelech. The city's fiery destruction recalls the curse.

God judges Abimelech through a woman on a wall. 9:50-57

 OThe reason for the attack on Thebez isn't explained, but as he did at Shechem Abimelech chose to burn the folks out, which backfires!
OAgain God uses an unlikely weapon (3:31, 4:21, 5:20, 7:19, 15:15), and for the 3rd time a woman is key. See the implications for us?
