From Triumph to Tragedy 11:30-12:7

Tragic zeal: Words that shouldn't have been spoken. 11:30-40

- ●Vows weren't uncommon (Jonah 2:9, I Sam. 1:11, Num. 21:3), but they were to be taken seriously, Dt. 23:21,23, Num. 30:2, Ecc. 5:4.
- •What was problematic with Jephthah's vow?
- ●What did Jephthah do? 1) sacrifice daughter, 2) isolate daughter in a life of celibacy, 3) celibate service at the tabernacle
- ●Consider 10:13,14,29, I Sam. 14. Why didn't God intervene?

Tragic pride: A password that couldn't be spoken. 12:1-7

- ●The threat to burn down Jephthah's house recalls Jephthah's vow. How might the taunt (*fugitives*) also infuriate Jephthah? Jephthah is not nearly as diplomatic as earlier or as Gideon was.
- •What do Ephraim's proud words here and in 8:1-3 reveal?

Contrast this event for Ephraim with 3:27-29 and 7:24,25.
