Grace Wins the Day Acts 15:1-35



Debate: Do Gentiles need to become Jews? 15:1-7a

OIntegrating Gentiles was a problem even for Peter, see Acts 11, Gal. 2:11ff.
 The dissension/debate is pretty heated, note this word in 23:7,10, 24:5.
 This issue is especially prominent in Galatians; Pauls' view = Gal. 2:21.

Conclusion of Peter: Not based on what I saw at Caesarea, 7b-12 • Recounting his experience with Cornelius shows up here, 10:44-48, 11:15ff. • Rhetorical question: salvation by anything besides faith = *testing* God (5:9); plus why demand Gentiles keep the Law when it was so hard for us Jews?!

Grace wins, legalism loses! Problem solved . . . or is it?

Conclusion of James: Not based on what I see in Scripture, 13-21

Jesus' brother once didn't believe (Mk. 3:21, 6:4) but later become a leader (21:18, Gal. 1:19, 2:9) probably after Jesus arose, Acts 1:14, I Cor. 15:7.
James appeals to Amos 9:11,12 for why not to impose the Law upon Gentile converts, but he does offer four prohibitions: Don't eat food offered to idols, strangled animals, or blood (Gen. 9:4, Ezek. 33:25, I Cor.8,10:20, Rev. 2:14, 20) and don't commit fornication (sex outside of marriage). Why these?

Decision of everyone: Send out men to clarify this issue, 22-35

Men from Jerusalem are sent along with a message: Judas Barsabbas (bro. of Joseph in 1:21-26) and Silas (Silvanus, who will later travel with Paul).
 The council's decision predictably brings rejoicing, as in 15:3.
