## An Introduction to Mark's Gospel Mark 1:1-8

## Who was Mark?

John Mark was the son of a devout lady (Mary) who provided a central meeting place, Acts 1:13, 12:12. He was Barnabas' cousin and colaborer (Acts 13:13, 15:37-38, Col. 4:10) and close to Peter (I Pt. 5:13).

## Why did Mark write his Gospel?

To offer Roman believers a written record of Jesus' remarkable life of sacrificial obedience that will clarify His divine mission as the messianic Son of God and clarify what exactly being His disciple will cost.

## What are some characteristics of this Gospel?

Mark's style is vivid and fast paced with a greater focus on Jesus' miraculous actions than on His words, with over 1/3 of the book detailing just the last week of His life. Jesus' desire to keep His identity secret initially creates the effect of a curtain slowly being lifted as to who He is. The disciples are often confused, yet they and everyone else are ever amazed at Jesus. A Roman centurion ironically finally exclaims at the cross what all should have figured out.



- **1:1** "The beginning of the good news about Jesus" serves as a title.
- 2-8 John the Baptist's ministry is abbreviated yet his death will be given more detail by Mark than the other Gospels (6:14-32). We'll see why later. John is a prophesied forerunner who is pictured as a rough character in a rough area preaching a rough message, yet people are overwhelmingly responsive to him. Question: Why did so many later bail on Jesus if they were so repentant? Any parallels today?
