Learning from a Tragic Fall II Kings 14:21-15:7

Jeroboam's successful but evil reign in the North (14:21-29)

OAs with Jehoahaz and Jehoash, God enables evil Jeroboam II to have even more undeserved military success, as predicted by Jonah (vs. 25). His long, glorious rule expands the kingdom to Davidic proportions.

• Amos and Hosea speak out, but to no avail so judgment day is closing.

Uzziah's successful and good reign in the South (15:1-7)

OLike Jeroboam, Uzziah is easily near the top as far as leadership capabilities go. As with Jeroboam, God helps him (II Chron. 26:5,7,15), and he pushes Judah's borders to Davidic proportions in the south as well.

- OGlowing terms are used in detailing Uzziah's many building projects, military improvements, and agricultural achievements ("loved the soil"). His fame (name 2x) and ability recalls David / Solomon's days.
- OPride = Uzziah's fall. Why would he do this and ignore Num. 16:40?
- OThe outbreak of leprosy seems mostly tied to his rage at the priests, which may have saved their lives. He handles reproof badly, just as his father and grandfather were furious when reproved, 24:21, 25:16.
- OTragic irony = by seeking a greater role (and a forbidden one) in the temple, he is now totally "cut off from the house of the Lord."



If we look at the tragic fall of Uzziah and his father and grandfather, it's not hard to spot some similarities. What should we do and beware of so that we avoid our own spiritual tragedy? Consider Ps. 1:1a, Heb. 3:13, 10:24,25, Prov. 12:1a, 27:5,6.

Tragedy is a tool for the living to gain wisdom, not a guide by which to live.
