Crummy Kings, Coups, and Breaking Cycles II Kings 15:8-38

A cycle repeated—five crummy kings continue an evil pattern (8-31)

- Repeated ref. (4x) is made to Jeroboam's "original sin" in I Kgs. 12:27ff.
- Coups create instability and brief reigns which undermine earlier success of Jeroboam II; Menahem now even appeals to Assyria for stability.
- Pekahiah is no doubt assassinated in part for his continued pro-Assyrian foreign policy, as Pekah is anti-Assyrian—which is a vain strategy now.
- According to Assyrian annals Hoshea was a puppet ruler till 17:4.
- ◆Recall phrase ("... made Israel sin"). We, as these kings, can do this!

A cycle broken—one alert king avoids a pattern of tragedy (32-38)

- Recall Jotham follows three good kings who all tragically fell.
- See II Chron. 27:1-7 for some specifics of his reign. Like his dad, he "did right" and was successful in building, warfare, getting tribute, etc., <u>but</u> he made sure to avoid dad's big mistake with incense!
- Jotham's legacy = he became mighty because of continued obedience and finished well—nice to read for a change!!!
