When Motives Are Misunderstood Joshua 22

Chapters 22-24 highlight Joshua's farewell speeches that encourage obedience to God's commands and consequences of disobedience.

Return of eastern tribes—commands for faithful troops, 1-9

- ♦Commendation of 40,000 troops (4:13) for fulfilling vow in 1:12-16.
- ♦ Commands to keep commandments and share spoils, Num. 31:27.

Rush to judgment by western tribes—crisis and near war, 10-20

- ◆Altar built by returning tribes creates a furor with western tribes.
- ◆Phinehas (Num. 25:6,7) leads delegation vs. Joshua or his dad (14:1).
- ◆Was their anger appropriate? See Lev. 17:8,9, Dt. 13:12-15. This action is seen as Achan-like (7:1) and Peor-like (Num. 25:1-9).
- ♦What irony! Building this altar was meant to maintain unity, but . . .

Response by eastern tribes—concern explained, 21-29

- \bullet You've misunderstood us--the altar \neq a replacement but a replica.
- ◆Altar is to be a *witness* (27,28, 34) so you don't forgot us (25, 27b). What from the past might make them decide to build an altar?

Resolution — crisis over, 21:30-34

Western tribes are pleased. Devastation is avoided. God is blessed.
