How a City without a Prayer Survived II Kings 18:13-19:37

Crisis—God's people and God under attack (18:1-37, 19:8-13)

- Hezekiah had refused to pay tribute as his dad had (16:7-9), unwisely relying on Egypt (21); and his "late payment" brought a stiff penalty!
- ❖This invasion was predicted 30+ yrs. ago (Isa. 8:7,8)—note irony of 18:17b and Isa. 7:3 = same spot Ahaz blew off God for <u>Assyrian</u> help!
- ❖ Hezekiah prepared Jerusalem, including a tunnel, II Chron. 32:1-5,30,

Speeches by Assyrians:

- #1: Don't trust in Egypt; you're weak; your God told me to destroy you!
- #2: Don't trust in Hezekiah; no gods delivered other kingdoms!
- #3: Don't trust in Yahweh; your God can't deliver you from destruction!
- Q: What should these Assyrian speeches remind us of? I Sam. 17, Ps. 2

Response of faith—Prayer for help and a prophecy (19:1-7, 14-34)

- ❖Unlike his dad, Hezekiah will humbly (sackcloth) turn to the LORD.
- ❖ Hezekiah appeals for God to react to the arrogant Assyrian reproach.

Climax—an enemy destroyed and its arrogant king doomed (19:35-37)

- ❖The Assyrians are slain (c/c with Herodotus and Sennacherib's Prism).
- ❖ Unlike Hezekiah, Sennacherib's temple offers no aid, II Chron. 32:21.
