A New Commandment

John 13:31-38

Leaving of Jesus will bring glory. (31-33)

- ♦ How should we understand *glory*? (5x in 31,32) 12:23-28, 17:1-5.
- ❖How will the disciples view Christ's death? Gruesome or glorious?
- ❖Jesus' describes His death as going / leaving (14:2,3,8,28, 16:5,7, 28). Antagonistic Jews were told they will seek Messiah in vain (7:33ff.,8:21,22) since they've rejected Jesus, but the disciples will later be with Him, 36b,14:3,19.

Love of the disciples will bring recognition. (34,35)

- ♦ How is this love commandment new (recall Lv. 19:18, Mk. 12:31)?
- 1. one another = believers (I Jn. 2:10, 3:14, I Thess. 4:9, I Pt. 1:22)
- 2. even as I have loved you = I Jn. 3:16, not "as yourself"
- 3. By this all men will know...= most visible / obvious proof
- Consider some ways Jesus loved the disciples . . . and why Peter doesn't think about that but instead changes the subject.

Loyalty of Peter will bring embarrassment. (36-38)

- ❖Pete first argued Jesus shouldn't wash his feet and now he argues Jesus shouldn't take off without him. So much for Jesus' plans!
- ❖Why does Jesus come down so hard on Peter (Mk. 14:29-31)? He obviously is less concerned with this new commandment and more interested in proving how courageous / loyal he is.



A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another.
