## Promises of Joy and Answered Prayer John 16:16-27

## Promise of joy to replace grief, 16-22

*16:16 repeats 14:19 but here "a little while" throws the disciples, who are already struggling to sort out Jesus' plans. Seeing Him again shortly refers to Jesus resurrection three days later.
$\star$ Contrast in vs. 20—Polar opposite responses to Jesus' death. It is a bit like in Rev. 11:10,11.
*Comparison in vs. 21—Childbirth analogy (Isa. 26:1-19, 66:7-14) shows swing of suffering joy. Joy $=5 x$ in 20-22, cf.15:11,17:13.
$\star$ Promise of joy here is for whom? And what about us? See in
I Pt. 1:8, Phil. 2:18, 4:4, Rom. 14:17

## Promise of answered prayer 23-27

*Two issues here--asking Jesus about things and asking the Father in prayer. Jesus will answer with less obscurity / plainly in that hour (25) = post resurrection talks, see Lk. 24:25-27.
*Divine switch occurs-just as the disciples will soon need to lean on the Holy Spirit for His help / information so too they will soon be addressing their requests to the Father directly, though "in His name" (i.e. prayers in accord with what His name stands for).
$*$ Vss. $24,26=3^{\text {rd }}$ time Jesus has pushed bold sounding / openended prayers (14:14, 15:7). Even if primarily for the disciples, see us too in I Jn. 3:21, 22, 5:14,15, Mk. 11:23-27, Js. 1:6,7, 4:3. $\star$ This promise sounds great . . . but why don't we always receive?

Though we can pray with boldness, issues like abiding, praying according to His will, keeping His commandments, faith, motives, and God's sovereign will all come into play.
