From Intimacy to Alienation Genesis 3:8-15

God confronts Adam and Eve, who are hiding in shame. 8-13

Intimacy/harmony with God is lost as Adam and Eve are in hiding.What are the implications of God addressing Adam first?

oWhy is God asking questions as if unaware of what is going on?

oHow do these two respond to disobeying God? How should we?

•God had predicted death for disobedience. In what way did they die? See Js. 1:15, Eph. 2:1, Rom. 5:12, 6:23, Jn. 17:3, I Jn. 5:11,12.

<u>God curses the serpent, predicting perpetual conflict and its end.</u> 14, 15 OAll creation falls with mankind (Rom. 8:20), but the serpent is most cursed and appropriately will now eat dust, Mic. 7:17.

•The greater conflict here is between Satan (force behind serpent) and the woman's *seed* (59x in Genesis!). This will mean satanic conflict with her seed (through Abraham): Jews in general, believers (Jewish & Gentile) and the ultimate seed, which is Jesus, Gal. 3:16,19.

• This conflict is a theme in Genesis and is later addressed in Rev.12. See Rom. 16:20, Rev. 20:10 for the crushing of the head of Satan. Then God will rule <u>on</u> earth. How should this prediction impact us?
